LOCAL HISTORY


As some of you may already know, Derby has a rich involvement in African American history. One of the more publicized figures is Ebenezer Don Carlos Bassett. He was born in Derby and in 1869 became the first African American diplomat in the history of the United States. However, there were other notable black figures from Derby during this time period- some of whom were designated as Black Governors.

Between the mid 1700's and mid 1800's, freed African-Americans in Connecticut began to form their own communities, including a political body. This led to the creation of the "Sable" or "Black" Governor position. Black Governors did not hold any real political power; their role was to serve as mediators between white and black communities. In Hartford, one of the duties of a Black Governor was to administer discipline to slaves who had disobeyed the law. Yet in other communities, the Black Governors served as a symbol of hope and freedom; "For enslaved and free communities of African descent, the elections of the governors asserted their humanity. Later, the elections of the Black Governors were to serve as vehicles to organize the abolition of slavery. Denied the official right to participate politically in the United States, African people in the Americas used the elections as a form of political revolt and self-determination*" They would handle legal problems within the black communities and advocate for African-American rights as well. Black Governors could be free men or slaves.

It is said that no other city provided as many Black Governor's as Derby. Two of the most famous, being descendants of the Freeman family. Quash Freeman was an African native that had been captured and sold to slave traders. His final master was Agar Tomlinson of Derby. In 1784 Connecticut passed a bill that began the gradual emancipation of slaves in the state. In 1800, Tomlinson emancipated Quash and gifted him 30 acres of land, a small dwelling, a barn, a cow, and a yoke of oxen. This was when Quash took the last name of Freeman. In 1810 he became the first Black Governor elected in Derby and served for five years.

Later, his son Roswell Freeman became a Black Governor as well. Born in 1804, Roswell was elected in 1830 and served for seven years. He was married to Nancy Freeman. They remained in Quash's household, located deep in the woods of Derby Neck (now part of Osborndale Park). Roswell died October 6, 1877 and was buried at Bare Plains Cemetery in Ansonia. Nancy remained a widow until her own death in 1895. In 2012, archeology students from Central Connecticut State University excavated the site where the Freeman home had once stood.

Take some time to explore Derby's fascinating and notable history this winter.



Other notable Black Governor's from Derby include Gov. Tobias and his son, Eben Tobias. Tobias was a slave owned by Captain John Wooster, a tavern owner in Oxford. Tobias married another one of Wooster's slaves, Rachel Hull in 1776. Through his service during the American Revolution he was able to gain his freedom.

In 1815, Tobias was elected Derby's Black Governor, maintaining the position between Quash and Roswell's elections.

In 1805, Rachel Hull gave birth to Eben Tobias. When he married his wife, Susan Bassett, he took on her surname. Eben Tobias Bassett was the father of Ebenezer Bassett. He served his term as Black Governor from 1840-1845 and was the last Black Governor in Derby. His family resided on farmland on Great Hill along the banks of the Housatonic River, belonging to Dr. Martin Bull Bassett of Derby.



Think of it as a sampling of what today's libraries are all about. Families are welcome to join in several activities throughout the day including a painting class presented by the **Giggling Pig Art Studio**, **Lego Time** and a drop-in **Crafty Kids** program. Therapy dog **Payson** and her owner Janet will also be in the Children's Room to welcome visitors, so stop by to say hello. Children ages 5-11 may register to read a book to Payson and learn more about our ongoing therapy dog program throughout the year. She just loves to meet new friends and shake paws!

Children's author Mem Fox has written in her book *Reading Magic* that "experts in learning and child development have discovered that if children know eight nursery rhymes by heart by the time they are four years old, they're usually among the best readers by the time they're eight." It is statements like this that support the relevance of books in a young child's world. It can encompass reading aloud, giving a board book to a toddler to "read" on their own or attending a story time to further stimulate their interest in books. Our winter session of weekly **StoryTimes** begins on January 11 and runs through March 16. If you are a parent or caregiver of a young child, consider attending a class and notice how quickly they begin to respond and participate each week with favorite rhymes, finger plays and songs. Our story times include **Mommy and Me** which is a lap sit program geared for infants birth to 12 months old along with a caregiver. It introduces our youngest patron to books, rhymes and songs taking place on Wednesday mornings at 9:30 AM. Toddlers age 13-24 months along with a caregiver are welcome to join us for **Wonderful Ones** to learn, play and grow through an interactive class that fosters developmental and social skills through stories, songs, rhymes, musical instruments and more meeting on Wednesdays at 10:30 AM. **Time for Twos** is offered on Thursdays at 10:00 AM for children 25-36 months old and their caregiver with an opportunity to listen to stories, sing songs, participate in early literacy activities and create a simple craft.

We are very excited to be hosting **It's Potty Time** on Tuesdays, February 21 and 28. This two part program is geared for parents, caregivers and early childhood educators focusing on how to implement the often daunting routine of potty training. In collaboration with TEAM, Inc.'s Family Resource Center, we welcome Elaine Langsam who will facilitate this informational and interactive workshop bringing an element of fun into accomplishing this step in a toddler's life. There is no fee to attend, but registration will be required. We look forward to offering other parenting programs throughout the upcoming year.

Just a reminder . . . we will continue our weekly after school **Crafty Kids** on Wednesdays and **Family Place – 1,2,3...Grow With Me** begins a new session on January 23. Registration is ongoing for the **1,000 Books Before Kindergarten** initiative. Stop by the Children's Room for further information on this wonderful literacy resource and check out our bulletin board of young reading stars who are currently participating in the program.

"I resolve to be more technologically savvy!"

With the new year upon us, this is traditionally a time when resolutions are made. So to help you accomplish any technology goals you might have for 2017, here are a few reminders about the Derby Public Library:

Charging Station – For your convenience, a charging station is located in the adult computer area on the Main Level for those who wish to recharge their mobile devices. The station accommodates Android, Apple, Micro-USB and many other common connection types to help you power up quickly.

Flash Drives / Earbuds – If you need them in a pinch, the Library continues to offer flash drives and earbuds for purchase. Please check with our circulation desk regarding cost and availability.

Parent-Specific Computers – We understand and sympathize the need for parents to multi-task when bringing their child to our Library. To facilitate this, two dedicated adult computers are located in our Children's Room so parents can check their email or get work done while their child is enjoying the fruits of our junior offerings.

Free Wi-Fi – The Library continues to provide free Wi-Fi for our patrons. One of our helpful staff members at the circulation desk can provide you with the secured password, so you'll be good to go.

Scanners – For those patrons who wish to create electronic versions (PDFs, JPGs, etc.) of their documents and photos, the Library is equipped with a total of 3 scanners – 2 in the adult computer area on the Main Level, and one in the Children's Room on the Lower Level. If you require any assistance with scanning, a Library staff member will be happy to help you.

Tech Time Classes – As we've done for many years, the Library continues to offer a pair of technology-related classes each month. Held the 3rd Wednesday and 3rd Thursday of every month, the topics are customized to the needs of the attendees and can range from effective Google searching to using your mobile devices to improving your Microsoft Word/Excel skills to creating and efficiently using your email account. All skill levels are welcome and no registration is required.

Downloadables – Between *Overdrive* and *Hoopla*, Derby Public Library card holders can use these web-based methods to temporarily download all sorts of electronic media, including movies, TV shows, audio books, e-books, music, and comic books, right to your mobile devices.

Online Databases – You can access a multitude of online databases right at your fingertips, such as, *JobNow* (employment), *Mango* (languages), *lynda.com* (instructional videos), *researchIT CT* (state-wide library search), and many more on all Library computers. Derby Public Library card holders can also access them remotely.

Facebook – If you haven't already done so, be sure to "like" our Facebook page to keep yourself current on the latest Library programs, *Tumbuck Tuesday* photos, and more.
